(SPEECH)

SPEAKER 1: When your mom didn't give you the answer you wanted, what did you do? Right, you asked your dad. This is not a good strategy when lifting. Cranes are designed with operator aides, some of them computerized to help prohibit unsafe operations. Bypassing computer controls, using rigging mode in order to perform operations a crane wouldn't otherwise allow may seem like a convenient shortcut. But it's often the quickest route to disaster. Dangerous situations like overloading or tube blocking could occur.

Don't be a cowboy and try to cheat the system. Only use rigging mode when permitted by the crane manufacturer. Don't use the override feature just to get a different answer. And remember, when your mom says no, it means no.
